### **International Women's Day**

On 8 March we celebrate International Women's Day. It is a

day for us to join voices with people around the world and shout our message for equal rights loud and clear: "Women's rights are human rights!" We celebrate all women, in all their diversities. It's a time to celebrate the achievements of women,

whether social, political, economic or cultural.

"DigitALL: Innovation and technology for gender equality" is the theme for the International Women's Day 2023. According to the United Nations the theme presents a few broader perspectives. Primarily it celebrates the women and girls who are championing the advancement of transformative technology and digital education. Secondarily, it reflects the

importance of protecting the rights of women and girls in digital spaces and addressing the gender-based violence against women and girls facilitated by information and communication technology. Thirdly, it is to explore the impact of the digital gender gap on widening economic and social inequalities. Over the years, the number of women entering India's technology sector remains only 33 to 34%. (*Report by 451 research*)

This International Women's Day invites us to focus on bringing women and other marginalized groups into technology so that they may engage in creative solutions and have greater potential for innovations that meet women's needs and promote gender equality. A gender-responsive approach to

innovation, technology and digital education can increase the awareness of women and girls regarding their rights and civic engagement.

### One Year On - the Invasion of Ukraine



Courtney Mares reports: Father Vyacheslav Grynevych vividly remembers the first day of the

full-scale Russian invasion of Ukraine one year ago. The Catholic priest woke up to a phone call: "Father, wake up because the war has started." "I understood that my life

would never be the same as before," Grynevych said. As the executive director of the Catholic charity Caritas-Spes, Grynevych soon found himself coordinating humanitarian efforts from a basement bomb shelter in Kyiv, also taking in 36 other people, mostly children, and their pets within the first week of the war.

In the past year, Grynevych and his team at Caritas Internationalis have worked tirelessly to provide food, shelter, protection, and health and psychological support to 3 million people within war-torn Ukraine. A few days ahead of the Ukraine war anniversary, the Catholic priest was able to speak one on one with Pope Francis at his Vatican residence to share with the pope updates on the Church's humanitarian efforts on the

ground. Grynevych presented Pope Francis with a cross

made out of broken glass and rubble from destroyed buildings in Kyiv in an emotional moment during their meeting. "I wanted to share with him the stories, the places that we see, the eyes of people," Grynevych said. In an interview with CNA in Rome on Feb. 22, the priest shared that he saw how much the pope was pained to hear about the experience of Ukrainians during the last year of war. (*Courtesy CNA*)

#### Earthquake in Turkey and Syria



The Vicar Apostolic of Anatolia in eastern Turkey reflects on the devastation caused by the February 6 earthquakes, talks about his audience with Pope Francis and the pontiff's constant support, and begs that the quake-struck peoples' plight may not

fall into oblivion.

As the death toll from the Turkey-Syria earthquakes exceeds 49,000, a humanitarian catastrophe is unfolding, with millions of people forced to leave their homes and depend on aid for survival. The Jesuit community is on the ground in both Turkey and Syria organizing relief and coordinating with humanitarian agencies. Jesuit Bishop Paolo Bizzeti, Vicar Apostolic of Anatolia, is coordinating aid response to the region. He says Pope Francis' constant appeals for prayers and support for the quake-struck people are a source of great fortitude.

Bishop Bizzeti recounts that he was in Italy the day the earthquake struck, for meetings with seminarians. "A providential coincidence", he said, "both because it may have saved his life, and because he feels that he is much more useful here, liaising with his community and the people it serves, coordinating with humanitarian organizations to be able to provide the most needed support and aid in the best possible way." Bizzeti who is also president of Caritas Turkey is preparing to go back to Anatolia, one of Turkey's most devastated regions, in the coming days. In an interview with Vatican Radio, he said the situation in the quakestruck regions remains fluid and is constantly updated. Expressing gratitude and feeling fortified and supported by the Pope, Bishop Bizzeti noted that the earthquake is a great tragedy; but, he said, "it is also a great opportunity to stop" and reflect on what warravaged humanity wants.
