Over the years so many things have grown around the beautiful feast of Christmas, some of them helpful, others less so. One such phenomenon is what has come to be known as 'advance Christmas'. Perhaps this is how the practice came about. Not wanting to miss the good feeling that Christmas brings with it, institutions, associations, schools, clubs, companies and other entities celebrate an anticipated version of it before dispersing for vacation. These pre-Christmas celebrations have become widespread in recent years. It seems naïve to be dogmatic about

If the sober season of Advent, as



Catechism teaches, is more about expectation, waiting and preparation for the great event of Christmas, and less about celebrations as such, we then need to back away from celebrations of all sorts, even of Christmas, until it actually arrives.

Thanks to the immense popularity of Christmas all over the world, the historical event that happened on a particular day at a particular place has today also become a season of celebrations. Just that it seems to make more sense when the extended celebration of Christmas happens after the feast of Christmas, not before it!

Holding Advance Christmases have a ring of craziness about them, like throwing a wedding reception and eating up all the cake before the couples have actually got married.

I just hope these lines don't come across to the reader as an effort at demonstrating or encouraging a 'holier than your Advent' attitude. In intent, they are anything but that. Here's wishing every reader of Link, the peace and joy of Christ Child. Merry Christmas!

SHG & Conflict Resolution

In the month of October 2016 JUST conducted a series of trainings on conflict resolution for the SHG women at Borkathal, Khowai, Twikarmaw, Burburia and Belbari. The Resource Person was Mr. Nipen Debbarma. 110 SHG members took part in the training programs. The main objective of the trainings was to enhance the SHG members on managing conflict. The training focused on improving the skill of



the SHG members in resolving conflicts. The Resource Person gave a brief introduction on conflict. He also shared on various points like diversity in conflict, miscommunication, feelings and emotion, differences and internal conflict. Group work was given to the participants in which there was active participation. Of the 3 groups the 1st and

2nd brought conflict and the 3rd group was to solve the conflict. The SHG members participated well in the group activities that were undertaken to give them more clarity and understand how to resolve conflicts in different situations in their day to day life.

Promotion of Traditional Farming systems and Practices

In the month of October 2016, JUST who was assisted by Caritas India under FARM Northeast Project conducted a series of programs at Village level. Series of consultation meetings on identification and sharing to promote traditional farming systems and practices for the farmers clubs under Hezarama R.D Block were conducted. The facilitators of the project were Mr. Vincent Debbarma, Mr. Amit Debbarma, Mr. Sunil Debbarma and Mr. Mantu Debbarma. About 326 farmers (121 Male and 205 Female) took part in the program. The Coordinator first shared about new project activities and then had session for open discussion with the farmers. All the programs were conducted successfully and concluded with vote of thanks and refreshment.

Pope Francis

In one of his final gestures in the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis made a surprise visit to meet seven men who took the controversial step of leaving the priesthood and starting a family. A Vatican statement said the Pope left his residence on Friday afternoon, November 11, and travelled to an apartment on the outskirts of Rome where he met seven men who had left the priesthood in recent years. The Pontiff also met their families. The Vatican said Francis wanted to express "his closeness and affection" to the men and their families. Earlier on Friday, Pope Francis met with thousands of homeless and marginalised people at the Vatican and asked for their forgiveness. "I ask your forgiveness if I have ever offended you with my words or for not having said something that I should have," the Pope said, according to Catholic News Service. Religion News Service

Over 900 million crossed a Holy Door this Year

Archbishop Fisichella said: "Finally, let us not forget that this Jubilee has journeyed also on the Internet! The site realized in seven languages has received more than 6,523,000 visits ... and there are more than eight million subscribers to the site. ... A word should

also be mentioned for the Jubilee Volunteers who came to Rome. There were more than 4,000. They came from 36 different countries, and the eldest was 84 years old, whereas the youngest was aged 18." Some 21 million pilgrims participated in the Jubilee in Rome. "The most numerous group consists of Italians, followed by German speakers, then the United States of America, Poland, and Spain, but also reaching Russia, China, Japan, South Korea, Venezuela, Chad, Rwanda, Angola, the Cook Islands, Nepal... in short, we can say that the whole world has come to Rome," Archbishop Fisichella said. Worldwide Catholics in 2016

As every year, Fides News Service offers statistics to give a panorama of the missionary Church all over the world. The tables are taken from the latest edition of the "Church's Book of Statistics" published (updated to 31 December 2014). To 31 December 2014 the world population was 7.160.739.000 with an increase of 66.941.000 units. The world percentage of Catholics increased by 0.09 %, settling at 17.77%. Bishops in the world increased by 64 units, to 5,237. Diocesan Bishops number 3,992 (47 more), while Religious Bishops number 1,245 (17 more). Priests total number in the world increased by 444 units, to 415.792. Diocesan priests increased

by 765 units, reaching a total of 281.297. The number of Religious priests decreased by 321 units to a total 134.495. Women Religious had an overall decrease in the number by 10.846 units to 682.729. Special feature prepared by S.L. Agenzia Fides 10/23/2016

According to the institution, the award was given after assessing various criteria that included infrastructure, courses offered, co-curricular activities, student support systems and operational quality data.
