Swachh Bharat Abhiyan should cleanse humanity of Prejudices, Hatred and Violence

Mahatma Gandhi was born on October 2, 1869. in Porbandar. He was shot and killed on January 30. 1948 when he was 78

years old by Hindu extremist Nathuram Godse. On his birth anniversary in 2014, the Swachh Bharat campaign was launched by Prime Minister Modi with much fanfare. The PM said his Govt. aims to eradicate open defecation by 2 October 2019, the 150th anniversary of the birth of Mahatma Gandhi, by constructing 90 million toilets in rural India at a projected cost of ₹1.96 lakh crore (US\$28 billion). Mahatma Gandhi, whom the nation had relegated to archives, came alive on his birthday that

The Swachh Bharat scheme is launched with Mahatma Gandhi as its inspiration. There are many stories about his cleanliness drives; but I mention just one. In 1901 while on his second visit to India, Gandhiji attended the Congress session in Calcutta. There were only a few latrines and the rush was big. He records, "I pointed it out to the volunteers. They said point-blank: 'That is not our work; it is the scavenger's work.' I asked for a broom. The man stared at me in wonder. I procured one and cleaned the latrine." He however could not persuade others to do the same. The sad experience of Calcutta Congress session burnt into him. Later when he had taken control of the Congress, he organized a party of two

thousand volunteers for doing scavenging work in Haripura Congress session, which



had men and women from all castes, including the upper caste. He had finally torpedoed the caste barrier at least in one area; other bastions of age old evil practices were to fall one by one in the years to come. (Reference: Bahuroopee Gandhi by Anu Bandopadhyay page 24 edition 1964)

The Swachh Bharat scheme is a cleanliness drive across the country. But as Mr. S.C. Jaini, retired Former Member of the Central Board of Direct Taxes New Delhi says, "Gandhiji was not only cleaning latrines in South Africa and in India, he was cleansing humanity of prejudices, hatred and violence. His mission was spiritual cleansing of not only India but of the world. His was a message of peace, nonviolence, love and brotherhood. When he spoke for the meek and the poor, he embraced the world... His presence was hailed by some as the second coming of Jesus. His fight for the oppressed was without bitterness, unlike the class war. In his war, the adversary was

disarmed without a duel." Gandhiji being chosen as an inspiration to Swachh Bharat, we have once again reaffirmed our faith in the legacy of the Father of the Nation. But do we have to invoke him for simple acts of cleanliness only?

Rome ad limina visit

The ad limina visit to Rome of Group #3 from September 18 to 27 comprising of 44 Bishops from the Ecclesiastical Provinces of Bombay, Calcutta, Delhi, Gandhinagar, Goa and Daman, Guwahati, Imphal, Nagpur and Shillong is just over. (No photo available as yet). As I had mentioned in my Circular Letter the Quinquennial visit as a canonical discipline requires a diocesan Bishop to observe the ancient tradition of the ad limina visit every five years, by venerating the tombs of the holy Apostles Peter and Paul and by meeting the Successor of Peter, the Bishop of Rome. The current visit however was after a gap of seven years and this time we did not have a one-to-one meeting with Pope Francis. However, he did address the whole group of Bishops and spoke at length to us. I must say that the meeting with the Holy Father was the high point of the ad limina visit.

seems, particularly true of today's young people who even as they are getting more entrenched in secularity day by day are also, paradoxically, longing for deeper connection and deeper meaning. It then follows that until those many programs which fill up our parish calendar, both the routine ones and special ones, are able to answer that deeply felt need of our faithful, particularly youth, sooner or later, their enthusiasm in them is likely to wane.

Today's young people who form the major chunk of the Church in Tripura, like their counterparts elsewhere, seem to put the highest value on 'personal experience'. They relegate everything else to the margins, even those things considered central to the tribe's culture and traditions. In other words, our Youth are inhabitants of a secret and dazzling 'world elsewhere'. Are our programs able to make inroads into that 'world elsewhere' and encounter the young person in a way that touches his/her utmost preoccupations and preferences?

That our Youth still actively attend our Church and its many programs is an overwhelming sign that the numerous escapades they are busy with today -'being online' or 'coming live on Youtube' hasn't satisfied their hunger. Their search for a profounder sense of 'being alive' goes on.

This offers us a challenge and an opportunity to make our programs platforms for them to have a personal experience of the One who gives life, life in its fullness (Jn 10:10).

Training on different Government Schemes



A series of Training on different Government Schemes available for the SHGs was conducted by JUST under Ganganagar R.D Block in Dhalai District. Mr. Lilmohan Reang was the facilitator of the training and he explained the various Schemes available for the SHGs such as Tripura State Support Project on SHGs (TSSPS). It is a state plan scheme being implemented in Tripura since 2009-10 and

there is a provision for providing soft loan for a maximum of Rs.25,000 at the rate of 4 percent interest and equal amount from Tripura State Co-operative Bank. Financing of Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) is another Scheme where the members who are engaged in similar economic activities and are willing to jointly undertake to repay the Loans taken by the group from the Banks can avail the Loan. NABARD Financial Services Ltd. (NABFINS): NABFINS also extends loans to SHGs through its own trained Business & Development Correspondents, Micro Enterprise Development Programme (MEDPs) is another scheme from NABARD where SHGs need-based Skill Development programs are being supported for mature SHGs which already have access to finance from Banks.

Five 'courageous people pick up "Asia's Nobel Prize"

This year's winners of the Ramon Magsaysay Award are (from left), Filipino musician Ryan Cayabyab, Thai human rights defender Angkhana Neelapaijit, Indian journalist Ravish Kumar, Myanmar journalist Ko Swe Win, and South Korean anti-bullying advocate Kim Jong-ki. Five Asians with a

"powerful sense of personal commitment" and an "uncompromising conviction about the fundamental dignity of everyone" have received this year's Ramon Magsaysay Award at a ceremony in Manila on Sept. 9. They join a long list of over 300 recipients from across Asia recognized for addressing human development issues "with courage and creativity, and in doing so have made contributions that have transformed their societies for the better," the awards panel said. In her address during the awards ceremony, Philippine Vice President Maria Leonor Robredo praised the "bravery" of this year's recipients in battling "injustices and cultures of violence" in Asian society, even as it has become far "too easy for some of us to forget those who are in need." She described the new laureates as "wellsprings of perpetual hope and titans of compassionate and transformative leadership."

Named after the third president of the Philippines after World War II, the Ramon Magsaysay Award is given every year and recognizes "greatness of spirit and transformative leadership in Asia."
