## Pastor's Corner

Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav is an initiative of the Government of India to celebrate and commemorate 75 years of independence and the glorious history of its people, culture and achievements.

Azadi Amrit Mahotsav means elixir of energy of independence; elixir of inspirations of the warriors of freedom struggle; elixir of new ideas and pledges; and elixir of Aatmanirbharta. Therefore, this Mahotsav is a festival of awakening of the nation; festival of fulfilling the dream of good governance; and the festival of global peace and development. Like the history of the freedom movement, the journey of 75 years after

independence is a reflection of the hard work, innovation, and enterprise of ordinary Indians. We are proud of our Constitution and our democratic traditions. Just a few days ago India got a new President in the person of Mrs. Draopadi Murmu who is India's first tribal President and the second woman to occupy this post. We congratulate our President who has become a ray of hope for Indians, especially the poor, marginalized and the downtrodden. It is a great triumph of inclusiveness and empowerment.

August 15 is the Independence Day of India. The Catholic Church also commemorates the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mother Mary on that day. I always say how lucky we are that our country, which we call Bharat Mata (Mother India), got its political freedom with the blessings of Mariam Mata (Mother Mary) on that very day! Happy Feast of the Assumption of Mary. Happy Independence Day.

Today is a time for every citizen to feel proud to be an Indian and celebrate the day joyfully. It is fitting that on this day, we take the pledge of dedication to the service of India and her people. Prof. Rajendra Pratap Gupta a senior strategist says, "It is a milestone to reflect back on as to what all we achieved in these 75 years, and what more we need to achieve. India has moved fast forward on all fronts, but due to lack of holistic approach, the success of one side is decimated by the ignorance of the other side... We need an Ecosystems approach and systems thinking; else we will remain a land of contradictions. In the last few decades, India has faced extremism fuelled by vile neighbors, but if we don't pay heed to the climate emergency, we will face internal catastrophes due to ignoring our environment which will decimate development. Already, according

to UN, India has lost about 25% of its GDP due to climate change."

Alongside our achievements and dreams we as a nation are undergoing tremendous challenges. Kalyani Shankar, a senior journalist says, "It has been a

> long and bumpy journey... The freedom fighters recognized that with the hardwon independence came tremendous challenges and responsibilities. The primary challenge in 1947 was to remain united, sovereign, democratic, and free, harmonious, and diverse. Partition left behind a mess. However, disproving many prophets of doom predicting India's balkanization, the country has moved forward in many areas. There

were tall leaders like Mahatma Gandhi, Nehru, and Sardar Patel who laid the foundation for building the country. Indeed, it is the story of success, yet a story of unfulfilled potential."

"In the initial stages, the challenges were too many. One major challenge was to establish democracy. Except for a brief period during Emergency, democracy survived in a country that was bogged down with illiteracy, massive poverty, and other ills. There were challenges in education, health, and other sectors, and they still remain as the recent pandemic proved the inadequacy. Today India can boast of being the largest democracy in the world."

"But some other elements of democracy have suffered. The values of the freedom struggle based on which Independence was achieved in 1947 are under threat. Communalism and divisive tendencies are spreading. There is a growing influence of money power and muscle power in politics. Institutions have become weaker. Political parties resort to the crudest, violent and polarizing techniques to mobilize voters in their quest for power. There is a need for a political consensus to restore those lost values."

Now that India is moving towards its ambition to becoming a global power, it needs a roadmap for the future. Looking forward, Prime Minister Narendra Modi has identified five agendas for the future. "Freedom Struggle, Ideas at 75, Achievements at 75, Actions at 75 and Resolve at 75 — we have to move forward with these five aspects." Every Indian has a role and should feel proud of being an Indian and take a vow to share in building a 'New India." #### **Revolving Fund for Self Reliance**



Ambassa (Tripura) June 26, 2022: Oisho Bani Society, a NGO with a vision: 'Towards a holistic Society based on Human Values' had a Review Meeting of all the beneficiaries in Ambassa. The revolving fund for self-reliance had started in a small way in 2019 helping the poor families to rear livestock with only Rs.1,20,000. The rule of the revolving fund is, at the end of the year, money has to return back with a few extra as interest. In 2021 the number of beneficiaries increased to 59 and the revolving fund committee could lend money Rs.4,64,000. Around 50 beneficiaries were present to assess the situation. Mr. Sunil Debbarma, the Secretary of the Revolving Fund welcomed them and briefed them about the agenda. Mr. Joy Manik Bongcher, the Assistant BDO talked at length about the benefits of the fund and encouraged the livestock rearing. Dr. Asok Debbarma, the active member of Oisho Bani Society praised the beneficiaries for being responsible and promised to help in different capacities. Fr. Ivan D'Silva the Parish Priest of Ambassa and the Treasurer of the OBS reiterated all that has been said. Pope Francis apologizes for harm done to indigenous Canadians at residential schools



In a speech in rural Canada before a crowd of indigenous Canadian people, Pope Francis publicly apologized for the Catholic Church's role in running much of Canada's government-sponsored residential school system. During more than a century of operation, the system worked to stamp out aspects of native culture, language, and religious practice.

"I am here because the first step of my penitential pilgrimage among you is that of again asking forgiveness, of telling you once more that I am deeply sorry," Pope Francis said in his July 25 speech. The speech marked Pope Francis' first public address since arriving in Canada on July 24 for a weeklong visit. The venue in Maskwacis, a rural town about an hour's drive south of Edmonton, is a circular arena typically used for pow wows.

Following a flight from Rome, the pope was greeted at Edmonton International Airport by Trudeau and other dignitaries July 24. On July 26, Pope Francis celebrated Mass at Commonwealth Stadium in Edmonton. Later that day, he participated in a pilgrimage to Lac Ste. Anne, one of the most sacred sites for Indigenous peoples of North America, long known as a place of healing. The pope also celebrated a Liturgy of the Word at the site. In his homily he said that Indigenous Peoples and grandparents are a precious treasure of the Church. *Catholic News Agency* 

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
