Why your child doesn't need a Smartphone!



The dangers of entrusting a child with a device outweigh the practicalities that many adults struggle to use safely and appropriately. A parent writes in *Cross Walk* that parental guidance is at risk of being trumped by the Smartphone unless we put a foot down. I found this write-up very insightful for us pastors and leaders, written as it is by a parent with teenaged kids, many of whom are in vacations with an electronic device as their only companion! +*Lumen, CSC*

1. Our society is addicted to Smartphones

The hardest part of parenting is teaching our children things we have not yet mastered. The only healthy addiction we are hardwired to foster is our relationship with God, through our walk with Christ. "I am," present tense, is all we need. Yet a glance around a room full of people looking down at a screen instead of each other illustrates the search for happiness elsewhere. Scientific facts tell us the same chemical released when we partake in age-restricted activities like smoking, drinking alcohol, gambling, or drug use (not that I would advocate for any of those things) is also released when we use cell phones and social media. Equipping our kids to live outside the confines of their wireless network allows them to participate in reality, and depend on the One in whom we truly find joy.



2. Parental controls can't control everything online

Kids are obsessed with bodily functions (at least mine are). Given access to Google, it's not hard to guess what their curiosity will lead them to type into that blank box, and there's little worse than fielding questions from a youngster about something their little eyes witnessed before ours. "Let the children come to me; do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God." (Mark 10:14) Jesus gave us a living example of how to treat children, and each other, when He welcomed all of us to be close to Him. How can we guide our children through conversations and shield them from adult ones when we aren't close enough to whisper in their ear? Remember, it's impossible to go back and block something that's already been seen.

3. Your child may be in danger

Technology can be used for evil. In fact, it is used for evil all the time. As parents, we must face a hard reality that the person on the other end of a message might be another innocent 12-year-old... or it could be a child predator. When you give your child a smartphone (or any other device that can download apps), you are putting your child at risk. In a technology-driven world, it is unrealistic to think that your child will never use a smartphone. So start teaching your child how to use technology safely before the cell phone is in her hands.

4. You might not be aware of what they are posting

Did you know there is an app that allows users to post their darkest secrets online anonymously? (It's called Whisper.) What about an app that sends texts and photos without being seen in the phone history? (That is the Kik app.) Finally, have you heard of Poof? That app can hide the icons for other apps that your child might not want you to see.

Result-time Blues!



Numerous schools and their thousands of students and parents are anxiously awaiting examination results these days. By the time this gets published, chances are, most results would have been declared already.

At such waiting times as these, someone or other is likely to remind us that good results alone don't add up. And that education is a lot about producing good and honest human beings...On our part, we fully endorse the idea. But frankly, we had always known that.



But say what you may, results are results! After all, at stake is the school's image, pride, identity and status determiner. It's also about years of struggle and hard work of students, their parents and teachers. What can there be more important than this! Schools might say.

This piece is not to say that academic excellence is unimportant. Instead this is to reiterate that true education cannot ignore formation of one's character, social sensitivity, beliefs, hard work and honesty.

We see around us parents who go to any length to ensure 'good education' for their wards, but pay scant attention to forming their character. The alarming manner in which the parents abdicate their duties signals nothing less than a 'crisis' in the family one that has untold implications on the future of the society. While excelling in academics is a top priority, acquisition of simple human values like the capacity to think about others and their needs, respect for parents, teachers and elders, ability to honor words and keep promises even when inconvenient, hard work, sacrifice and growth in faith seem relatively low priorities.

To overcome this crisis, it is necessary for the school, the parish and most importantly the family to join hands in a focused manner. Even if the school decides to make amends and change tracks, the no-holds-barred approach at home renders all that ineffective. Hence, the need to adopt a united approach.

As an entity engaged in a major way in education, the Church has the obligation to move away from mere competition-based mark-oriented approaches and ensure healthier attitudes to education. We also have an equal obligation to be at the service of families in their struggles to remain 'sane' while bringing up their children.

Health Camp

A Medical Health Camp was organized by JUST at Dharmanipara under Ganganagar PHC on 4th April. Dr. Philip Reang, Medical Officer, Ganganagar PHC examined the patients during the Health Camp. About 132 patients (63 Male and 69 Female) were diagnosed and given

free medicines through the health camp. The patients were mostly women and children. Most of the patients had complaints of Fever, Headache, Cough, stomachache, skin diseases, etc. But the maximum number of patients were suffering from fever, cough & Mal-nourished. The doctor also sensitized the people saying that fever is common during this season due to rise in temperature. So he warned the patients to stay indoors during extreme heat and not to consume water without treatment.

Capacity Building for the Disabled

In the month of April, JUST under CBR project, organized trainings on Capacity Building and Strengthening of the Village Disabled Peoples Organization in all the target villages under CBR project. About 97 people (Male-32, Female-65) took part in the training programs. The training program was to capacitate the VDPO Members and also strengthening them on

their rights by developing action plan for their entitlements at the Panchayat level. Inputs were given on maintaining account books and minutes book for improvement of the Groups. It was also learning for all the Groups on the importance of conducting their monthly meetings regularly. They were also told about all the rules and regulations that can be applicable for the improvement of their groups. The Training was conducted successfully at all the target villages.

Migrant communities find pastoral care in Bangalore
