




As we remember Mahatma Gandhi

We celebrate the Mahatma Gandhi's birthday on 2nd October. I thought it appropriate to mention pertinent quotes which challenge us as Christians.

When the missionary E. Stanley Jones asked him, "Mr. Gandhi, though you quote the words of Christ often, why is that you appear to so adamantly reject becoming his follower?" Gandhi replied, "Oh, I don't reject Christ. I love Christ. It's just that so many of you Christians are so unlike Christ. If Christians would really live according to the teachings of Christ, as found in the Bible, all of India would be Christian today," he added.

Gandhi's closeness with Christianity began when he was a young man practicing law in South Africa. Apart from being attached with the Christian faith, he intently studied the Bible and was also seriously exploring becoming a Christian, which led him to his discovery of a small church gathering in his locality.

After deciding to attend the church service in South Africa, he came across a racial barrier; the church barred his way at the door. "Where do you think you're going, *kaffir*?" an English man asked Gandhi in a belligerent tone. Gandhi



replied, "I'd like to attend worship here." The church elder snarled at him, "There's no room for *kaffirs* in this church. Get out of here or I'll have my assistants throw you down the steps."

This infamous incident forced Gandhi to never again consider being a Christian. In July 1925 told a group of women missionaries, "...although I am myself not a Christian, as a humble student of the Bible, who approaches it with faith and reverence, I wish respectfully to place before you the essence of the Sermon on the Mount..." He continued to adopt many values he found in the Bible, which acted as a panacea to many of India's problems during its

freedom struggle.

As we remember the Mahatma let us be challenged to live our Christian lives more meaningfully, just as he said, "To live the gospel...not just preach but live the life according to the light... If, therefore, you go on serving people and ask them also to serve, they would understand. But you quote instead John 3:16 and ask them to believe it; and I am sure people will not understand it...the Gospel will be more powerful when practiced and preached... A rose does not need to preach. It simply spreads its fragrance. The fragrance is its own sermon...the fragrance of religious and spiritual life is much finer and subtler than that of the rose." +*Lumen, CSC*



Editorial

Family Matters

A few hours ago Pope Francis set foot on the United States of America on a 6-day tour. As expected, the visit has generated a great deal of hope and euphoria. The world is eager to see what Pope Francis has got to offer the last superpower of

the modern times, and the whole world. We are told his American trip will end with a solemn Holy Mass on 27 September at the conclusion of the World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia.

There is no doubt by so arranging his itinerary Pope Francis wanted the world to share his focus on Families worldwide.

The subject of 'families' brings us back to what happens in our own backyards. We are yet to hear what Francis has got to say to families in America and elsewhere. But we can already anticipate that much of what he's going to say will surely make sense to families elsewhere too.

Even in our little corner of the world, 'family' is an oft-heard word. It comes up in our casual talk for a variety of reasons. For it's shrinking size, for example. It's difficult not to be struck by the small size of families one finds in Tripura,



especially among some of the tribes. It is all the more striking because there is a general notion that tribal communities believe in having many children. Most of the tribes in Tripura prove that assumption blatantly wrong.

A family is a 'sanctuary of love and life'. It is the most basic, safest and best sanctuary one can belong to. If there is a crisis in families today, perhaps, it is because we have allowed crass commercial concerns and hedonist tendencies to invade and impoverish the sanctity and warmth of these sanctuaries.

In Tripura, one cannot only see a growing gap between the rural families and urban ones, but also a tendency in the rural populace to migrate to urban areas. Moving into the town is, in itself, perceived as advancement. When a family, already microscopic in size, gets divided due to town-ward movement of some of its members, relationships are affected and ultimately fissures appear in the family.

There is never a dearth of discussion and debate on 'the tribe' in Tripura. Every platform, every party, every peer group seems to have a hundred proposals on how to improve the tribe. Perhaps, it is time we devoted a little bit of our time and attention to something that's much closer to us our families. One just hopes the American engagement of Pope Francis currently underway on the other side of the globe will contribute to this. **J. Pulinthanath, SDB**

Medical Camp

The Malaria control project of JUST conducted 16 mikings, 8 Community Message Disseminations and 8 infotainment activities in the project areas in Khowai & Dhalai Districts. The Field Supervisors along with the community health volunteers organized the programme in the villages covered by the project. During the programme, Awareness on malaria was given to the people; the

main topics discussed during the programme are; malaria signs, symptoms, diagnosis, treatment and prevention.



Community message dissemination on malaria focuses the village panchayat member, MPWs, ASHA, teachers, elders, youths and Anganwadi workers. All the BCC activities are conducted once in a year in each village except miking which is conducted twice in every year in all the target villages. *Mr. Vincent DebBurma*

Catholic Nun receives award for Excellence in Education

An Apostolic Carmel nun based in Pune has been conferred a prestigious award named after a 19th century social reformer for educating girl children. Sr. Marisa, principal of Mount Carmel Convent School, Lullanagar, Pune, received the Kranti Jyoti (light of revolution) Savitribai Phule Award at a function on August 19 in Pune. The award, reserved only for women achievers, comprises a citation, memento, and a book in Marathi on the life of Savitribai Phule, who championed girl children's emancipation. Pope Francis in the U.S.A.

Pope Francis is now on his 10th foreign trip since his election in March 2013. This week-long journey (Sept. 21 to 27) takes him first to Cuba and then to the United States and the United Nations and is widely considered "the big one" of the year. He began his global travel last January with a second trip to Asia, visiting Sri Lanka, a mostly Buddhist country, and the Philippines, the continent's most populous Catholic country. In June he made a one-day visit to Sarajevo, the capital of Bosnia and Herzegovina, a state on Europe's periphery that is still recovering from war. Then in



July he returned to Latin America to visit three countries on its peripheries: Ecuador, Bolivia and Paraguay. At the end of November, he will go to Africa for the first time, to visit Kenya, Uganda and the Central African Republic.

This first pope from the Americas is universally recognized as a profoundly spiritual and humble man, a true follower of Jesus with unlimited love and passionate concern for the poor, the migrants, people who are suffering, those on the peripheries of society and the excluded. In two and a half years as leader of the Catholic Church, he has shown such an extraordinary ability to express God's love for people in concrete and original ways that he has inspired Catholics

worldwide and gained the admiration and respect of millions of followers of other religions and even of those who profess no faith. After two decades of experiencing dismay, shame and anger at the sexual abuse and other scandals in their church, Catholics are again feeling proud to belong to the church he leads, "a church that is poor and for the poor," a nonjudgmental church that serves as a "field hospital." *(Gerard O'Connell America via CNUA)*
