EDITORIAL

Foundations Destroyed

The penultimate week of August saw the State of Tripura reel under the biggest flood it experienced in recent times. As per reports, more than 1700 thousand people were affected, about 128 thousand were shifted from their homes, and over 10 thousand houses were destroyed at least partially. Saddest of all, 24 people lost their lives. It is reported that the total loss was estimated to be around 5000 crores. In many places, areas that were thought to be generally immune to flood got inundated catching unaware so many residents. Incessant rains caused landslides, thereby compounding the situation further.

The disaster that struck Tripura was not a stand-alone calamity. It was the latest in a series of natural disasters that took place in various parts of our country - prominent among them the Wayanad and Uttarakhand ones. Besides the pain, sorrow, and irretrievable loss that such tragedies bring about, the common thread that runs through all these is man's greed and his irreverence of our common home, the Earth. Experts often explain natural calamities as nature's way of reclaiming its rightful share when human greed thoughtlessly denies it.

In matters of climate and environment, it has become fashionable to make politically correct noises about how the bird population is declining in Hawaii, crabs are vanishing in Alaska, or the Amazon Rainforest is getting depleted. While being so vocal about matters global, it is intriguing how we fall silent when they're about similar things in our locality. Not just silent but dangerously complicit many times!

The neck-breaking speed at which change happens in some facets of life often makes us tolerant of even blatant


violations that harm nature and the environment in the long run. I live in an area that has witnessed amazing changes in recent years. Vast stretches of uninhabited land have changed into a densely populated residential area. Plots of land, earlier thought far-flung, and inconvenient have today become prized locations. This is true, we know, of most places where our institutions come up. Most families in these new settlements are, interestingly, grappling with boundary-related problems: *their garbage is dumped onto our land, their toilets are too close to our wall, their boundary wall is preventing us from turning our car, etc.*

And regarding drainage – well, it seems so unreasonable and uneconomical to waste space for simply water to go, when all we have is 2 *ghantas* bought for a fortune. The truth is that when economy takes precedence over environment, the matter is no longer a neighbor-issue, but a nature-issue, and the recent floods in these settlements were perhaps a grim reminder of that from the side of Mother Earth.

The takeaway is that we should become more sensitive to the harm we do overtly or covertly to the environment and nature by our selfishness and greed. As long as we feel no qualms of conscience about smelly dustbins right under our noses spilling onto public spaces, plastic and debris piling up in our backyards, and used statues of deities filling up our water bodies, there isn't much hope.

And we as a Church, could think of *Laudato Si* to become part of our relief package for flood-affected victims.

Inter-School Sports Meet for Peace

After the competitions, winners were honored with trophies, and all participants were recognized for their involvement, emphasizing the inclusive spirit of the meet.

Awareness Programs on different Government Schemes

A series of Awareness programs on different Government schemes available for the SHGs was organize by JUST in the month of June, 2024 at different villages under Ganganagar R.D Block in Dhalai District. Mr. Lilmohan Reang and the 3 animators were the facilitators in the programs. They explained various schemes available for the SHGs such as Tripura Rural Livelihood Mission (TRLM) which is a state plan scheme being implemented in Tripura since 2019-20 that has a provision for providing soft loan maximum of rupees 25,000 at the rate of 4 percent interest and equal amount from



Tripura State Co-operative Bank. Financing of Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) is another scheme where the members who are engage in similar economic activities and are willing to jointly undertake to repay the loans taken by the group from the Banks can avail the loan. They also explained to them about PMAY-G scheme under PM-JANMAN for the Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Group (PVTG) which is a housing scheme for the Reang tribe who does not have any government job in the family members can avail. SHG members are now more knowledgeable of government programs and welfare schemes which they can access to improve the situation of their household.

Tripura Floods Update

Flood update as on August 24, 2024: Till date, 24 persons died, 2 injured, 2 missing, damages upto 5000 crores

Due to very heavy and continuous rainfall since 19th August 2024, Tripura faced unprecedented floods in the State. According to the Tripura' disaster management

authority (TDMA) Gomati, South Tripura, Unakoti and West Tripura Districts have been severely affected. The situation is being closely monitored by the Chief Minister, Tripura. Today, Chief Minister conducted aerial survey and made physical visit to the flood affected areas at Khilpara in Gomati and Bokafa in South Tripura Districts along with senior officials Kiran Gitte, IAS and Abhishek Singh, IAS of the State Administration.

National disaster response force (NDRF), along with State disaster response force (SDRF) jawans have been engaged in the rescue of flood victims in the state non-stop for last 96 hours! It is reported that Tripura's own disaster

response force modeled on the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) established with selected TSR personnel last fifteen years ago. This is the first time Tripura witness such a huge devastating flood across the state. And (SDRF) jawans have been working non-stop for the last 96 hours along with the NDRF to rescue the flood victims. During this rescued period these young SDRF jowans did not rest for a single time except to take food. State Police DG Amitabh Ranjan praised the SDRF and NDRF jawans for their tireless work.

In order to tackle a possible outbreak of post-flood waterborne diseases in the 558 relief camps opened across the state the state health department has cancelled leave of all health staff including doctors for the next three days. A large section of health staff has been deployed to examine the health condition of 1.28 lakh people including women and children sheltered in camps all over the state. There is a fear that in the post-flood situation a outbreak of waterborne diseases is possible among the affected people.

Meanwhile, the power department seems to have been the worst affected by the recent rain and flood. Altogether 1603 electric poles have collapsed all over the state over and above the irreparable damages caused to altogether 501 transformers and two substations of 33 and 66 KV, he said. "According to primary estimate the power department in the state has suffered a loss of Rs 9.2 crores but this may go up further when final estimates are made," said Abhishek Singh. Apart from this, the revenue secretary Brijesh Pande said that the monetary value of losses suffered by the state in the recent flood and rain may reach Rs 5 thousand crores, according to estimates made so far but this may be more as making final estimates may take a longer period of time.
