Global Matters, Local Matters

The Conclave that gave us Pope Leo XIV last month generated an unprecedented level of interest not just in the Catholic Church but the world over. The amazing things that communication technology can now do alone, however, cannot account for such interest. More likely, it is because the world now better understands that the impact a Pope has on the entire world far exceeds his role as the spiritual leader of over 1.4 billion Catholics in the world.

Each time the white smoke billows out from that famous chimney, the world, even its remotest corner, waits with bated breath to hear the name that follows the tidings 'Habemus Papam'. One might ask, how does it matter so much to us, here in Tripura, who becomes the Pope? On deeper thought we realize, it does matter. While the papacy is headquartered in Vatican City, its influence stretches into every corner of the world, from the rainforests of South America to the mountains of Southeast Asia.

From the perspective of the Universal Church, the diocese of Agartala is a small but vibrant Catholic community in one of the distant and ethnically diverse States in north-eastern India. Though geographically distant from the Vatican, as a diocese we are deeply connected to the global Church, and the Pope's vision can shape our path in important ways.

Like Francis before him. Pope Leo XIV too has already spoken about the need to focus on 'peripheries'. It augurs well for minority communities and dioceses like Agartala where Catholics are a tiny minority in a predominantly multi-ethnic-religious region. It further shows that the Church is a mother to all; it recognizes the faith and cultural contributions of every tribe, culture and people.

It is fascinating how the theological vision and pastoral priorities of the Pope shape the tone and direction of the Church. The values he emphasizes will filter down through bishops and local clergy, energizing parishes in far-flung areas that might at times feel forgotten. His homilies, encyclicals, and world travels can bring the voices of the marginalized to the forefront, providing recognition and dignity to small communities who share in the global Catholic

In the secular field too, the papacy continues to exert 1 significant influence on global affairs, shaping discussions on peace, climate action, interfaith relations, human dignity, etc. One cannot but wonder how a two-thousand-year-old | institution called Papacy continues to bring about significant changes simultaneously on a global level and at the village 1 level!

Agartala Diocese has stepped into its 30th year of existence. As part of the Universal Church every parish in the Diocese. under the leadership of our dear Bishop, feels close to Leo XIV, the newly elected Vicar of Christ on earth.



Pastor's Corner

OUR NEW POPE LEO XIV

Here are excerpts from Dr. Fr. Francis Kodiyan MCBS from his insightful Editorial entitled Pope Leo XIV and the Church in the Age of Artificial Intelligence. He says,

by adopting the name Leo XIV, the new Pope appears poised to revisit that bridge, not as a relic but as a structure still vital for navigating today's global inequities. Our modern world is not post-industrial so much as hyper-industrial -driven by automation, fractured by economic disparity, and endangered by ecological collapse. The digital revolution. like steam-powered predecessor, has created staggering wealth -and equally staggering alienation. The plight of the gig worker, the migrant laborer, and the displaced family echoes the workers' struggles Leo XIII tried to address.

Pope Leo XIV's name thus places him squarely in continuity with a Church that takes the material conditions of humanity seriously. Equally compelling is the legacy he inherits from his immediate predecessor, Pope Francis. If Leo XIII brought the Church to the factory floor, Francis brought it to the peripheries - spiritual, ecological, and geographic. Leo XIII addressed the dignity of workers in the factory, Leo XIV must defend the dignity of persons in the digital sphere. Where Pope Francis urged the world to listen to "the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor," Leo XIV must now consider the cry of the human soul in a time when algorithms risk replacing empathy, and data replaces dialogue.

With his choice of the name Leo, he signals a Church ready to engage with the moral challenges of digital life - courageously, intelligently, and pastorally. We can expect from this papacy a deepening of Catholic teaching on the ethical use of artificial intelligence. A Church that speaks clearly about "algorithmic conscience" -the imperative that technology just never eclipses the moral agency of the human person; a Church that reminds the world that data is not destiny, and that dignity is not digitized. If Leo XIII gave us the Church that defended the worker in the age of industry, and if Francis gave us a Church that embraced the poor and the planet, then Leo XIV may give us a Church that speaks to the digital conscience of our age - forming not only coders and policymakers, but disciples capable of ethical discernment in an automated world. 

Golden Jubilee in Kachuchara Village



St. Arnold Catholic Chapel in Kachuchara joyfully celebrated 50 years of its existence on May 5. 2025. The chapel, one of the substations of Holy Spirit Parish, Ambassa, has been a beacon of faith for the local community since its founding in 1974. Preparations for the Golden Jubilee began a year in advance. Although Bishop Lumen Monteiro, CSC, had limited availability due to other commitments, he confirmed his presence for May 5, bringing great joy to all. Leading up to the day, all eyes were on the sky, anxious about the weather-but the day turned out to be perfect, and everything went according to plan. Over 450 people gathered to commemorate the occasion. The chapel was freshly painted, a new toilet block and a stage for the felicitation program were constructed. Fr. Hormis John, CSC, one of the first Holy Cross missionaries to Kachuchara community, unveiled a commemorative plague inscribed with the following: "This plaque is to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of St. Arnold Kachuchara Village Chapel, 1974 to 2024, blessed by Bishop Lumen Monteiro, CSC, and unveiled by Fr. Hormis John, CSC, and Fr. Ivan D'Silva, SVD, on May 5, 2025." The plaque was blessed by the Bishop who also released a dove as a symbol of celebration and peace. The Holy Mass was presided over by Bishop Lumen and concelebrated by seven priests, accompanied by a melodious choir. A well-organized felicitation program followed, during which former chapel leaders were honored for their unwavering service to the Church. Fr. Hormis John, reflecting on the past, shared: "I thank God for the wonders He has done. I remember the early days when I had to walk through this area-sometimes even face wild elephants. I once had to climb a tree to save myself. Times have changed, and the Gospel has truly taken root in this part of Tripura." The celebration concluded with colorful cultural dances and a sumptuous meal for all attendees, bringing to a close a day filled with gratitude, unity, and spiritual joy.

Confirmation & 1st Holy Communion







Residents escape as flames take hold of a Boys' Boarding House in Ambassa



On May 8, 2025, around 2:00 AM, loud screams alerted me to a fire in the St. Arnold Hostel near the presbytery. The fire had already engulfed the top part of the building. Thankfully, all 30 boarding children (KG-Class II), along with two hostel wardens, two female teachers, and two cooks, had evacuated safely.

I immediately alerted the police and fire services, and contacted parishioners for help. Firefighters arrived within 15 minutes and extinguished the fire by 4:00 AM. The electrical department later indicated that a short circuit likely caused the fire.

The hostel, a former priest's residence with 15 small rooms and a tin roof, is completely destroyed. The children's books, beds, and personal belongings were reduced to ashes. Fortunately, no injuries were reported.

Parents, mostly poor farmers from distant villages, rushed to check on their children. We assured them that the school will provide books and uniforms free of charge. A formal letter has been sent to the local administration requesting an investigation.

Need-based Capacity Building for Students and Teachers to promote Peace



This program was organized under the Peace project at JUST Hall Damdamia. 113 students and 33 teachers from 18 schools of Tripura attended the program. The resource person, miss Merelin Darlong, Assistant professor, National Law University discussed various topics relevant to the peace clubs' functions, peer mediation to resolve conflict among friends, function of teachers as counselor, mediator and role model. It was an interactive session where teachers too shared various problems they face in schools when dealing with children, mediating conflict, or when talking about sensitive topics such as culture and conflict.

The resource person stressed that the role of teacher is not always to solve but sometimes just to listen and show empathy to the problems of students.

There was also a group activity for teachers where the teachers through practical actions tried to understand the situation which the students might face and how a teacher should approach it as an impartial mediator. At the same time the resource person for students Mrs. Momita Reang, Soft skill Trainer had an interactive session with the students where she discussed various important topics such as verbal and non-verbal communication skill to develop confidence, importance of facial expression in communication, understanding how to behave in public and interact with one another, improve active listening skills and much more. She also used activities to make the sessions fun and interactive to ensure maximum participation understanding.
